Congregation 2 December

(1) Voting on changes to the Conduct of Ceremonies in Congregation, and certain other Ceremonies

Explanatory Note

At the meeting held on 24 February 2025, the General Purposes Committee agreed to some changes to the Latin used within ceremonies. These proposals were in turn agreed by Council and Congregation (including some amendments agreed at a meeting of Congregation on 29 April 2025) and they took effect on 1 October. Subsequently, a small number of remaining discrepancies in approach from the approved changes have been identified. The proposed changes have been identified by the University’s Latinists and are now proposed for incorporation into the regulations.

Text of Regulations

In [Congregation Regulations 3 of 2002](#), concerning the Conduct of Ceremonies in Congregation, and certain other Ceremonies, amend as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

‘Incorporation

...

3.26. (1) For a graduate above the Degree of Bachelor of Arts or Master of Engineering or Master of Natural Sciences the form of supplicating shall be: “*Supplicat A. B. e Collegio (or ex Aula or e Societate) C., Magister in Artibus (or Baccalaureus or Doctor in S. Theologia or Doctor in Litteris or Doctor in Scientia, or Baccalaureus or Doctor in Jure or Baccalaureus or Doctor in Medicina or Magister in Chirurgia, or Doctor in Philosophia) in Academia Cantabrigiensi (or Dubliniensi) creatus hic adstans, cui licentia incorporandi per Concilium data est, ut bona vestra cum venia admittatur ad eundem gradum statum dignitatem et privilegia apud Oxonienses, ~~quibus ornatus est~~ quae habet apud suos Cantabrigienses (or Dublinienses).*”

(2) For a Bachelor of Arts or Master of Engineering or Master of Natural Sciences the form shall be: “*Supplicat A. B. e Collegio (or ex Aula or e Societate) C.,*

Baccalaureus in Artibus (or Magister in Ingeniaria or in Scientiis Naturalibus) in Academia Cantabrigiensi (or Dubliniensi) creatus hic adstans, cui licentia incorporandi per Concilium data est, ut bona vestra cum venia admittatur ad eundem gradum statum et dignitatem apud Oxonienses, quibus ornatus est quae habet apud suos Cantabrigienses (or Dublinienses); necnon ut [duodecim] terminos in eadem Academia completos hic secundum rationem Oxoniensem sibi reputatos habeat.”

...

(2) Voting on Resolutions approving the conferment of Honorary Degrees

(ii) That the conferment of the Degree of Doctor of Civil Law, *honoris causa*, upon **John Kerry**, Honorary KCMG, attorney, politician, diplomat, and former naval officer, former Senator and presidential candidate, former Secretary of State and US Special Presidential Envoy for Climate, recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom, be approved.

(iii) That the conferment of the Degree of Doctor of Civil Law, *honoris causa*, upon **Dinah Rose**, KC, President of Magdalen, be approved.

(iv) That the conferment of the Degree of Doctor of Civil Law, *honoris causa*, upon **Professor Irene Tracey**, CBE, FRS, FMedSci, Vice-Chancellor of the University, be approved.

(v) That the conferment of the Degree of Doctor of Letters, *honoris causa*, upon **Sir John Curtice**, Professor of Politics at the University of Strathclyde, Senior Fellow at the National Centre for Social Research, former President of the British Polling Council, Fellow of the British Academy, the Royal Society of Edinburgh, and the Royal Society of Arts, Honorary Fellow of the Royal Statistical Society and the Market Research Society, be approved.

(vi) That the conferment of the Degree of Doctor of Letters, *honoris causa*, upon **Christina Lamb**, OBE, journalist and author, chief foreign correspondent of *The Sunday Times*, 7-time recipient of Foreign Correspondent of the Year, as well as the European Prix Bayeux-Calvados for war correspondents and Lifetime Achievement Awards from the Society of Editors and Women in Journalism, honorary fellow of University College, be approved.

4.2. The forms of supplication under regulation 3.11 in Part 3 of these regulations shall be as follows.

(vii) That the conferment of the Degree of Doctor of Letters, *honoris causa*, upon **Dr Dominic Sandbrook**, historian, writer and broadcaster, co-host of ‘The Rest is History’, former Visiting Professor at King’s College London, Fellow of the Royal Historical Society, be approved.

(viii) That the conferment of the Degree of Doctor of Science, *honoris causa*, upon **Professor Jonathan Haidt**, Thomas Cooley Professor of Ethical Leadership at the New York University Stern School of Business, New York Times bestselling author, member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, co-founder of Ethical Systems and the Heterodox Academy, be approved.

(ix) That the conferment of the Degree of Doctor of Science, *honoris causa*, upon **Isabella Tree**, author, writer and conservationist, recipient of a CIEEM Medal, the Royal Geographical Society’s Ness Award and co-recipient of the Zoological Society of London’s Silver Medal, be approved.

By longstanding tradition, the new Chancellor of the University is invited to propose candidates for honorary degrees at a special ceremony to mark the start of their Chancellorship (including an honorary DCL for the current Vice-Chancellor and for the current head of the Chancellor’s college).

If the resolutions are approved, the degrees, proposed by the Chancellor to mark the commencement of his period of office, will be conferred at a special ceremony on Tuesday, 24 February 2026, or at a future Encaenia.
