General Purposes Committee of Council

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes to regulations, to come into effect on **24 July**, unless notice of a resolution calling upon

Council to annul or amend the regulation is received by the Registrar by **noon on 20 July** (as set out in Statute VI: Council).

(a) Ashmolean Museum Western Art Print Room Fund

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the legacy gift from Larissa Haskell.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning Trusts, add:

‘Ashmolean Museum Western Art Print Room Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude a legacy gift from Larissa Haskell to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Ashmolean Museum Western Art Print Room Fund (“the Fund”).
2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).
3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards supporting the work of the Ashmolean Museum’s Western Art Print Room in the continued care and conservation of the Museum’s collection of prints and drawings.

4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Ashmolean Museum Executive Committee.

5. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund.

6. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

7. These regulations shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

8. Subject to regulation 9, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

- (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
- (2) be outside the objects of the University.

9. Any amendment to the main object(s) as set out in regulation 3, must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.’

(b) Churchill Associate Professorship in US Politics Fund

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the gifts.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning Trusts, add:

‘Churchill Associate Professorship in US Politics Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude gifts to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in

this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Churchill Associate Professorship in US Politics Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).

3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund to establish and maintain an associate professorship in politics. (“the Associate Professor”).

4. The Associate Professor shall be known as the Churchill Associate Professor in US Politics, and shall undertake research, lecture and teach in politics within the University’s Rothermere American Institute.

5. The Fund shall be used to pay the salary and expenses of the Associate Professor and associated overheads. If the salary, expenses and overheads of the Associate Professor are wholly or partly covered from other sources or there are further funds available, there shall be discretion to apply the Fund to support the Associate Professor’s research.

6. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Humanities Board.

7. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 23 February 2047, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

(c) Pao Scholarship Fund

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the gifts from Mr Andreas Sohmen-Pao and Mr Philip Pao Sohmen.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning Trusts, add:

‘Pao Scholarship Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude gifts from Mr Andreas Sohmen-Pao and Mr Philip Pao Sohmen to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Pao Scholarship Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are

12. Any amendment to the main object as set out in regulation 3 must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.’

4. The scholarships shall be known as the Pao scholarships and shall be available to graduate students demonstrating exceptional academic merit and/or potential commencing a course of study in the field of Humanities at the University.

5. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Humanities Board.

6. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 9 April 2046, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the

whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

7. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund, and the scholarships.

8. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

9. These regulations shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

(d) Paul Foundation Professorships Fund

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the gifts from the Paul Foundation.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 25 of 2002, concerning Trusts, add:

‘Paul Foundation Professorships Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude gifts from The Paul Foundation to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Paul Foundation Professorships Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).

3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, to establish and maintain 2 professors in the field of child and adolescent mental health (“the Professors”).

4. The first professor shall be known as the Paul Foundation Professor of Developmental Clinical Psychology (the “first professor”). The second professor shall be known as the Paul Foundation Professor of Children and Young People (the “second professor”). The

5. The Fund shall be used to pay the salary and expenses of the Professors and associated overheads. If the salary, expenses and overheads of the Professors are wholly or partly covered from other sources or there are further funds available, there shall be discretion to apply the Fund to support research within the Centre.

6. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Medical Sciences Board.

7. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 29 May 2046, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

8. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund, and the Professorships.

9. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

10. The Professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.

11. These regulations or Regulations shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

12. Subject to regulation 13, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of

Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

(1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or

(2) be outside the objects of the University.

13. Any amendment to the main object(s) as set out in regulation 3, must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.'

(e) Paul Foundation Professor of Developmental Clinical Psychology

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the gifts from the Paul Foundation.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning Academic and Other Posts, add:

'Paul Foundation Professor of Developmental Clinical Psychology

1. The Paul Foundation Professor of Developmental Clinical Psychology shall undertake research, lecture and teach in the field of child and adolescent mental health, and shall act as director at the Oxford Centre for Emerging Minds Research.

2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:

(1) the Vice-Chancellor;

(2) the head of the college to which the Chair may be allocated by Council from time to time; or; if the head

is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of that college;

(3) A person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in clause (2);

(4), (5) 2 persons appointed by Council;

(6)–(9) 4 persons appointed by the Medical Sciences Board;

(10) A person appointed by the body or bodies which may issue an honorary clinical contract or contracts to the professor.

3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to the chair.

4. Part of the income of the Paul Foundation Professorships Fund shall be applied towards the salary and expenses of the professor.'

(f) Anne T. and Robert M. Bass Professorship of Developmental and Stem Cell Biology as Applied to Medicine

Explanatory Note

The following changes have been made to update the electoral board, to make explicit the requirement for the Professor to undertake research and to add certain standard trust provisions. Numbers are also being written as numerals rather than words, in line with Oxford style guidance.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning Academic and Other Posts, amend the Anne T. and Robert M. Bass Professorship of Developmental and Stem Cell Biology as Applied to Medicine as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'1. The benefaction of \$4 million from Anne T. and Robert M. Bass, together with any further donations for this purpose, shall be used to establish and maintain the Anne T. and Robert M. Bass Professorship of Developmental and Stem Cell Biology as Applied to Medicine.

2. The University shall retain all of the benefaction as permanent endowment and shall apply the net income towards the salary and expenses of the holder of the Professorship, and associated overheads.

3. The administration of the benefaction, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Medical Sciences Board.

4. The Anne T. and Robert M. Bass Professorship of Developmental and Stem Cell Biology as Applied to Medicine shall undertake research in stem cell biology and lecture and teach in this subject~~give instruction in stem-cell biology.~~

5. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:

(1) the Vice-Chancellor;~~or if the head of the college specified in paragraph (2) below is the Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council;~~

(2) the head of the college to which the Chair may be allocated by Council from time to time; or if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of that college;

(3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college;

(4), (5) ~~two~~ 2 persons appointed by Council;

(6)–(9) ~~four~~ 4 persons appointed by the Medical Sciences Board.;

(10) a person appointed by the body or bodies which may issue an honorary clinical contract or contracts to the professor.

6. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations, which are applicable to the Chair.

~~7. Regulations 1–2 shall be deemed as Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI. Regulations 1–4 and 6–13 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.~~

~~8. Regulations 3–6 may be amended by Council. Subject to regulation 9, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:~~

(2) be outside the objects of the University.

9. Any amendment to the main object(s) as set out in regulations 1 and 2, must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.'

(g) Savilian Professorship of Astronomy

Explanatory Note

The following changes, made on the recommendation of the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Division and the Department of Physics, and with agreement of New College, clarify the role, update the membership of the electoral board, and replace outdated references. Numbers are also being written as numerals rather than words, in line with Oxford style guidance.

Text of Regulations

In Council Regulations 24 of 2002, concerning individual professorships, amend the Savilian Professorship of Astronomy as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

'Savilian Professor of Astronomy

The Savilian Professor of Astronomy shall undertake research in and shall lecture and give instruction in theoretical or practical astronomy and ~~shall be responsible for general instruction in astronomy~~ generally promote the study of astronomy in the University.

2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:

(1) the Vice-Chancellor;~~or, if the Warden of New College is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council on the occurrence of a vacancy to act as an elector on that occasion;~~

~~(5) a person appointed by the General Board;~~

(6)–(9) 4 ~~four~~ persons elected by the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Board ~~of the Faculty of the Physical Sciences.~~

3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the ~~decree~~ regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same ~~decree~~ regulations which are applicable to this chair.'
